If we want to build something timeless, let's stop building in silos. Let's start building systems that listen, learn, and liberate.



KNOWLEDGE SESSION

SOCIAL STARTUPS INNOVATING FOR INDIA'S UNIQUE CHALLENGES



The opening session of the AndPurpose Forum in New Delhi set the stage for a deep dive into the power and potential of social entrepreneurship in India. The session brought together trailblazing social entrepreneurs and innovators to unpack India's unique development challenges and chart bold, actionable pathways toward sustainability. With a sharp focus on scaling impact, technology for good, and community-rooted innovation, the discussion provided key insights into how social startups are redefining India's social enterprise ecosystem. It spotlighted both the structural barriers that persist and the opportunities that lie ahead to create enduring, inclusive change.

The conversation tackled urgent gaps in the ecosystem. From the scarcity of patient capital and the communication gap between impact and outcome, to the fragmented knowledge systems that still shape misguided development policies. Speakers emphasized the need for collaborative ecosystems, community trust, and storytelling that connects profit with purpose.

Technology and AI emerged as enablers of precision restoration, traceability, and grassroots innovation. While a call to anchor solutions in lived realities reminded all that scale without sustainability is short-lived. From restoring lakes to rethinking fashion waste, the session made one thing clear: India's future will be built not just with capital and code, but with context, courage, and community.

Social enterprises often struggle to articulate their value beyond financial metrics. There's a growing need for storytelling that blends business outcomes with social and environmental impact to attract partners & funders. -Aishwarya Lahariya, Founder, Jiwya

The conversation on "Building a Climate-Conscious India" served as an urgent call to embed climate consciousness into the fabric of India's policy, economy, and society. Highlighting stark data on record heat and severe river pollution, the panel championed a multi-pronged approach to drive systemic change. Key solutions discussed included empowering citizens as energy "prosumers" through rooftop solar, transitioning to a circular economy for urban resource management, integrating smallholder farmers into the climate economy with carbon removal platforms, and making climate literacy a core part of youth education. The overarching message was a clear mandate for collaborative, data-backed, and community-led action to build a resilient and sustainable future.

From the economics of clean energy to grassroots resilience, the session called for a conscious shift in how we think, act, and lead climate responses over the next 25–30 years. Highlighting stark data on record heat and severe river pollution, including the fact that just 1.6% of the Yamuna's length through Delhi accounts for 76% of its total pollution, the panel underscored the depth of urban environmental crises.

At the same time, it spotlighted transformative solutions already taking root: carbon removal is no longer a distant vision but a grounded reality. With platforms like Varaha enabling smallholder farmers to become climate stewards, boosting soil health, generating verifiable carbon credits, and creating rural income pathways. Marking on the awareness of climate change, the session reflected that while 95% of Indians believe in climate change, a national school survey found two-thirds of students don't know how composting works, and 40% think plastic is biodegradable. The gap between awareness and real climate literacy is still dangerously wide.

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BUILDING A CLIMATE CONSCIOUS INDIA

Turn Waste Into Wealth: Cities Must Close the Loop, Not the Landfill

India's urban future hinges on shifting from disposal logic to regenerative design. Construction debris, industrial byproducts, and household waste aren't liabilities; they're untapped assets in a circular economy where materials are salvaged, repurposed, and reintegrated into the value chain.

Climate Equity Begins at the Margins

Climate shocks aren't felt equally. Farmers, fishers, and informal workers are Delhi's first responders to environmental collapse. Policies must prioritize adaptive justice, placing the most vulnerable at the center of resource allocation, not at the edge of survival.

Storytelling is Infrastructure

Facts don't move hearts—narratives do. From polluted rivers to heat-scorched streets, we need climate communication that is local, visual, and emotionally resonant. Culture-backed storytelling must become as core to infrastructure as policy or capital.

From Moderator's chair, this session served as a crucial call to action, highlighting urgent climate realities like extreme heat and river pollution. It championed a multi-pronged approach, empowering citizens as "prosumers," fostering a circular economy, integrating farmers into carbon removal, and enhancing youth climate literacy. The consensus emphasized collaborative, data-backed, and community-led action for a resilient, sustainable future.

India's Investment Imperative: Climate action needs scale. Globally, \$6-8 trillion is needed annually to build resilience. India alone must mobilize \$250 billion over the next five years to transition responsibly and equitably.



KNOWLEDGE SESSION

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UNLOCKING INDIA'S CSR & IMPACT FINANCE POTENTIAL



As India's role in shaping the global development agenda expands, this session explored how the country can strategically harness its growing reserves of CSR and impact capital to drive lasting change. Amidst a shifting aid landscape, it made a compelling case for designing homegrown financial systems that serve both purpose and performance.

The conversation traced the evolution of CSR from a compliance checkbox to a lever for long-term transformation, and highlighted the critical role of impact finance in unlocking innovation across clean energy, agriculture, and climate resilience. India's ₹1.6 lakh crore CSR spend and the exponential rise of ₹90,000 crore in impact finance reflect significant momentum, but also reveal sharp inequities in fund distribution and outcome measurement.

Speakers underscored that the real challenge isn't the lack of capital, it's how that capital is deployed, how risk is shared, and how outcomes are tracked. The session called for a redesign of traditional investment mindsets, urging a shift from short-cycle thinking to patient, values-aligned capital that supports deep social innovation.

From purpose-first CSR models that transcend regulatory mandates to blended finance strategies that de-risk frontier sectors, the conversation laid a powerful blueprint for what it means to fund impact with intention.

When capital flows with clarity of purpose, transformation isn't just possible, it's inevitable.

UNLOCKING INDIA'S CSR & IMPACT FINANCE POTENTIAL

Shift from Funding Projects to Shaping Systems

To truly unlock transformative outcomes, CSR and impact finance must focus not on isolated interventions but on systemic change, reshaping how sectors operate, how value is shared, and how longterm resilience is built.

Local Innovation, Global Relevance

India's CSR and impact finance ecosystem has the potential to set global precedents, especially in climate-smart agriculture, water stewardship, and circular economy models led by local communities and companies.

Redesign Risk for the Rural Economy

Traditional venture models fall short in rural India. Risk models must be tailored to seasons, soil, and social change, supporting long-gestation R&D and innovation beyond metropolitan markets.

Time Is the Catalyst, Not the Constraint

Lasting impact doesn't follow a quarterly cadence. Water regeneration, soil recovery, and livelihood revival unfold over years, not months. Funders must be willing to stay the course.

Nonprofits Are Not Just Enablers, They're Builders In today's capital landscape, nonprofits must position themselves not as passive implementers but as coarchitects of innovation, offering agility, access, and domain intelligence.

KEYNOTE



FROM COMPASSION TO CAPABILITY



In a thought-provoking keynote fireside conversation, Sudarshan Suchi, Chief Development Officer at Reliance Foundation, distilled the wisdom of a 37-year journey across India's most impactful institutions into a timeless blueprint for transformative social change.

Far from a conventional keynote, the session unfolded as a compelling case for rethinking how we design, measure, and sustain impact in India's evolving development landscape.

Challenging the deeply ingrained culture of interventionism, Suchi championed a shift from doing for communities to building with them. He called on leaders, funders, and changemakers to act not as commanders of capital, but as conduits of capability, moving resources, trust, and ownership into the hands of those closest to the problem.

His message was rooted in radical empathy and system-level thinking: **immerse before you ideate, learn before you lead, and design for dignity, not dependency**. Whether discussing rural immersion practices at Reliance Foundation or his commitment to gender justice, Suchi emphasized that true transformation requires not just strategy but structural humility.

From yielding space to India's youth and institutionalizing gender equity, to embedding exit strategies into program design, the keynote offered a masterclass in scale that starts small, and solutions that honor complexity. What emerged was not a grand vision, but a grounded manifesto: real change is not linear, it's lived, over time, through trust, and alongside communities.

Communities should be allowed to fail, to experiment, we must plan our own exit.

The goal isn't dependency, but dignified autonomy.



KEY LEARNINGS



FROM COMPASSION TO CAPABILITY

With a career spanning rural transformation, child rights, sustainable agriculture, and systems philanthropy, Sudarshan Suchi brought unmatched depth to the conversation on what truly makes impact endure. He emphasized that real change starts with proximity, detailing how every new team member at Reliance Foundation lives for a month in rural India, experiencing life without electricity, sanitation, or gas. "We design in boardrooms, but impact is lived in villages," he noted, positioning empathy not as sentiment, but as a strategic design principle.

'On the idea of scale, he dismantled the obsession with numbers, arguing that true scale begins with design fidelity. "Understand the microcosm before attempting to scale," he said, **reminding the audience that health**, **livelihoods**, **and education don't exist in silos**, **and neither should our solutions**.



Design Through Immersion, Not Assumptions

"We design in boardrooms, but impact is lived in villages."

At Reliance Foundation, new team members spend a month living with rural families. Empathy is not a buzzword - it's an operating principle, practiced through direct experience of deprivation, resilience, and resourcefulness.

Let the Young Lead Now - Not Later

"They don't need directions. They need space. And Google."
India's youth - nearly 50% of the population, don't need blueprints handed down to them. They need room to create their own.

Older generations must shift from controlling the narrative to enabling experimentation.

Build Inner Belief—Not Outer Dependency

"Empower people to become agents of their own upliftment, not beneficiaries of charity."

True social transformation is psychological as much as it is structural. The goal is not service delivery - it's self-belief.

When communities own the narrative, progress becomes self-sustaining.
